As we did five years ago, when the Feast of our Lord's Presentation, February 2nd, also fell on a Sunday, we will begin Mass next weekend with the traditional blessing of candles and procession (processions remind us that we are a pilgrim people, which is especially appropriate during this Jubilee Year).

Forty days after his birth, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to fulfill two Mosaic laws: to present their firstborn son to God and to "purify" Mary after childbirth, along with the appropriate sacrifices. Although neither Jesus nor Mary needed "purified", they participate in these rituals as faithful and observant Jews within their community.

Since Jesus is revealed as "a light of revelation to the nations and the glory of God's people," candles are blessed on this feast for use at home and during liturgy, reminding us that Christ is the light of the world.

Members of the congregation are asked to gather in the narthex/vestibule/entrance area of the cathedral. The cathedral bell will call us to gather there 10 minutes before Mass time. The bell will ring again at the hour.

The taper candle you carry may be taken home. Devotional candles for home use will also be available for a donation.

The Jubilee logo shows four stylized figures, representing all of humanity, coming from the four corners of the earth. They embrace each other to indicate solidarity and fraternity which should unite all people. The figure in front is holding onto the cross. It is not only the sign of the faith which this lead figure embraces, but also of hope, which can never be abandoned, because we are always in need of hope, especially in our moments of greatest need.

There are rough waves under the figures, symbolizing the fact that life's pilgrimage does not always go smoothly in calm waters. Often the circumstances of daily life and events in the wider world require a greater call to hope. That's why we should pay attention to the lower part of the cross which has been elongated and turned into the shape of an anchor which is let down into the waves. The anchor is well known as a symbol of hope. Just as an anchor stabilizes a ship, hope stabilizes our lives, especially during stormy situations.

The pilgrim's journey is dynamic and communal, marked by an increasing movement closer to the cross. The cross is also dynamic as it bends down towards humanity, not leaving human beings alone, but stretching out to them to offer the certainty of its presence and the security of hope.

At the bottom of the logo is the motto of the 2025 Jubilee Year: Pilgrims of Hope.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIP-**TURE**

January 26, 2025

3rd Sunday of Ordinary Time

Luke 1:1-4, 4:14-21

A young couple in my parish told me they were expecting their second child, a baby boy. I knew that their five-year old only child Emma had been desperately wanting to be a big sister for years, so I said, "Emma must have been so happy when you told her the news." "Actually," they said, "she burst into tears. She wanted a baby sister!" How often in life God wonderfully fulfills our desires and we are sad because we don't approve of the way he does it. We want to control the gift and the delivery method.

The same thing occurs in the Gospel this week when Jesus announces in his hometown that the promise of an Anointed One bringing glad tidings to the poor is "fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21). After a moment of elation, his fellow townsfolk realize this man is the way God is fulfilling his promises, and they erupt into a violent outburst. So Jesus departs. How sad for them.

Every single Sunday at Mass, including this one, some version of this happens to many of us. God's word announces the fulfillment of God's promises in Christ, and we easily overlook or disdain it. His way is almost never according to our narrow expectations. What's required of us is to set these aside, and to embrace a new openness to God's gifts, no matter how he wishes to give them. God is fulfilling his promises the way He likes — why be sad?
